# Methodology

GQR conducted a 20-minute mixed mode survey among 800 registered voters (907 unweighted) in Michigan from October 5-12, 2023. Interviews were conducted using a mix of live dialing and online panel and include extra completes from Black registered voters in Michigan.


Because part of the sample is based on those who initially self-selected for participation in the panel rather than a probability sample, no estimates of sampling error can be calculated. All sample surveys and polls may be subject to multiple sources of error, including, but not limited to, sampling error, coverage error, and measurement error.

If this poll were conducted among a probability sample, then the margin of error would be +/- 3.5 percentage points at the 95 percent confidence interval; the margin of error is higher among subgroups and online respondents.

The data are statistically weighted to ensure the sample's regional, age, and gender composition reflects that of the estimated electorate in Michigan.







### **Class regions within Wayne County**













## Both national parties unpopular, local Democrats more favorable







# Overall crime seen as serious problem on MI; over half of Black voters say very serious problem







# **Comprehensive frame does better than "tough on crime"**

(COMPREHENSIVE) Fully fund things to create safe communities and improve people's quality of life, like good schools, a living wage, and affordable housing, and do more to prevent crime by increasing treatment for mental health and drug addiction and getting illegal guns off the street. (TOUGH ON CRIME) Doing more to get tough on crime, like having tougher sentences for people convicted of violent crimes, maintaining strong bail laws to keep potentially dangerous people in jail, and providing police more support and resources.




### Safety and justice frame does well with Black voters, white voters split


(DEM - WE CAN HAVE SAFETY AND JUSTICE) Some say crime is out of control and, to make communities safe, people who break the law must be held accountable. This means seeing the harm they've done, accepting the consequences, learning from mistakes, and changing their behavior. Harsh punishment and long sentences alone lead to more violence. We need to provide people with programs that work to turn their lives around and prevent future crime.

(REP - DO THE CRIME, DO THE TIME) Others say crime is out of control, and we need to make sure that people who break the law are held accountable by enforcing strict punishments. If you do the crime, you should do the time, and that means serving the full sentence. Offenders shouldn't be able to get out of jail or prison early simply because they complete programs or have a good track record behind bars.







### Voters hearing from both parties on crime, more intensity from GOP


How much do you hear from **Democrats** on crime and making communities safer? Would you say you've heard a lot, a moderate amount, just a little, or nothing at all?

### Framing crime in partisan context

(SPLIT) (DEM COMPREHENSIVE FRAME) Democrats will make Michigan's communities safer, preventing crime before it happens by investing in schools, housing, and mental health and addiction programs. Addressing violent crime means getting illegal guns off the street, improving police response times and solving serious crime. Democrats support police who put their lives on the line but also hold them accountable for abuse. Unlike Republicans, who oppose programs that prevent crime and common-sense gun laws, Democrats have solutions that work to make every neighborhood safe.


(SPLIT) (DEM TOUGH FRAME) Democrats will restore law and order to Michigan's communities. Addressing crime means getting illegal guns off the street, improving police response times and solving serious crime. Democrats will add more funding for police, crack down on violent criminals, and go after the worst offenders by imposing stricter sentences. Unlike Republicans, who talk a big game but oppose common-sense gun safety laws, Democrats know what works to be both tough and smart on crime.

(GOP) Republicans are tackling crime and protecting law-abiding Michiganders. They will stop the revolving door for criminals, make sure criminals serve their full sentence and force prosecutors to prosecute all cases, big and small. Republicans will "back the Blue" by increasing police funding and putting more officers on the streets. Unlike Democrats, who support "soft on crime" policies like eliminating cash bail and releasing violent criminals from prison early, Republicans will restore law and order to stop crime



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# **Key Findings**

# **Key findings**

- Michigan voters place crime and gun violence among their top concerns.
  - Democrats rate reducing gun violence as their top priority above cost of living and inflation.
  - Black voters rate reducing gun violence and crime as top priorities.
- Voters tie the drug crisis closely to crime their top ways to decrease crime deal with stopping fentanyl, opioids, and methamphetamines and providing treatment.
- The comprehensive frame is more popular than the tough on crime frame
  - Particularly among young and Black voters, those in Detroit, and in the upwardly mobile and blue-collar industrial regions
- Michiganders think Republicans are slightly better at reducing crime, indicating a need for Democrats to speak to the issue more.
- After hearing a comprehensive frame for Democrats, their support in the 2024 legislative elections slightly increases overall, and increases considerably among independents, young people, white men, and in swing regions across the state.
